From Father McCabe

National Eucharistic Revival The reception of the Sacrament of Baptism into Jesus Christ and his Catholic Church begins our journey to God's heavenly home. We arrive in the fullness of heaven where the covenant is fulfilled perfectly in every way for the person who dies with sanctifying grace within them. A covenant is different from a contract, since a contract is an exchange of services, whereas a covenant is an exchange of persons in the bond of love and fidelity. This is why Jesus Christ in the Eucharistic Covenant is the source and summit of our Catholic faith.

While they were eating, Jesus took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and giving it to his disciples said, "Take and eat; this is my body." Then he took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you, for this is my blood of the **covenant**, which will be shed on behalf of many for the forgiveness of sins." Gospel of Matthew, 26:26-28 (Being sorry for any venial sin and receiving Holy Communion in the state of grace forgives a person of those sins for which they are sorry).

Another testimony from one of our parishioners:

Jesus describes the human person through multiple parables in the gospels as a "house" (Hebrews 3:3-6, Matthew 12:43-45, Matthew 7:24 NRSV). When I picture a house, I see a dwelling place in which people live. I find this to be one of the most fitting descriptions of humans because we are a physical body in which a communion of spiritual persons may live. The "good news" is we receive the love of God (Holy Spirit) in baptism and receive Jesus in the Holy Eucharist...these are the two divine persons we must strive to invite into our house if we are to be accepted into the Father's house.

This "good news" is hard to grasp if we don't first accept the "bad news" ... there are fallen spirits in the world constantly tempting us to abandon God's plan for us. They invite themselves into our "house" and kill the life of God through mortal sin. And they don't necessarily tempt us to become overwhelmingly evil...they tempt us to think about anything but God. They create in us a love for created things rather than love for the creator. With all the distractions of our time it's very easy to capture one's intellect. Once our intellect is obtained, whatever we think about drives our will, and our will dictates what we do with our life.

In my own life I've experienced being subject to the fallen spirits and conforming to the relativistic culture of hedonism and materialism. My deepest motivation as a young farmer and father was that of consumerism. Driven by fear, I genuinely believed consumerism (fulfillment is based on the quality and quantity of what we have) was the path to ultimate happiness. In pursuing that objective, my "house" was disordered, anxious, depressed and unfulfilled. I continued to appear "Catholic", but by name only. I lived simply to fit into the surrounding culture. A culture in which many profess faith, but morally do not live any different than an atheist. I would pick and choose for myself what I believed to be morally upright and deny any guilt or need to repent. During these years I would continue to receive Holy Communion, and as St. Paul writes...

"Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be answerable for the body and blood of the Lord." 1 Corinthians 11:27 NRSV

So whether I believed it or not, it is his body I received and my mortal sin crucifies him and he will not enter my "house."

My son's fatal diagnosis in utero of bilateral dysplastic kidneys is what sparked my reversion to the faith. I first experienced Christ and his willingness to suffer through someone in our parish who took



the time to visit us and pray in our home. As I wanted to reject and mourn the idea of suffering, they spoke of joy and purpose behind all suffering. She told us of losing her own son and the beauty in his short month of life. I found peace in her testimony. I knew she had something I did not, so I began to commit to prayer. As time passed, I began to be convicted by the Holy Spirit and through confession and continual repentance, my "house" is being swept clean and continually remodeled from within...

Throughout this process the Eucharist was the source of conversion. The more time I spent in prayer the more my eyes were opened to my sin and how much spiritual debt I've acquired. I was drawn to adoration to pray for my son Gabriel, but slowly began to understand the path of destruction I had left behind through anger, pride, envy, lust, drunkenness, greed and spiritual sloth. First through prayer (especially the rosary), then routine confession and finally uniting myself and my son in the Eucharist in a state of grace. I was humbled and given the will power to engage in the daily spiritual battle of virtue and vice. As my faith in the Eucharist slowly grew, a true relationship emerged. Jesus healed everyone he touched in the gospels and that's how I've learned to approach the Eucharist... ready to be transformed.

So I encourage and pray for everyone reading this to take a break from our "on demand, high speed, microwave" culture which leads nowhere and reflect on who's dwelling in you? I've found that spiritual humility begins in prayer that's beyond asking for "health and wealth." If we do not pray, we do not understand sin which blinds us and prevents us from living with God. Continuously ask the Father for the Holy Spirit to convict, cleanse and purify your life and be transformed by the Son.
