### **True Freedom**

The natural gifts we have of "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness" come from God. These natural rights have been defended and nurtured by freedom loving people who have gone before us. We must do the same for our children. We need to help them understand the difference between wrongful discrimination which attacks "certain unalienable rights" like life, and justified discrimination, for example, not everyone is able to win the gold medal because we are not equal in every way. Females and males are equal in dignity, but different and complimentary. Our country has been established on *natural law principles* embodied in the *Declaration of Independence*: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." Now, not everyone can become a doctor just because they want to be "happy". Thus, organizations and sometimes the government need to *justly discriminate* against those who are unable or unwilling to study sufficiently to be a doctor. *Unjust discrimination* is not letting an able and educated person become a doctor because of their race or creed.

"Life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness" is God's order. Without our government and "We the people" protecting the first gift of "life", the other gifts of "liberty" (especially religious liberty that points to God's gift of life) and the "the pursuit of happiness" (which is based on knowing the truth of reality), are weakened.

Yet, some want to destroy God's gift of human "life" and weaken God's sacred order of how life is received, by the union of a man and woman. These confused people defend the *false right to abortion and the false right to homosexual marriage*. We need to pray for them and respectfully help them to see the error of their thinking. These errors are moving us away from God's design of a truly human society ordered to God's glory. Clearly abortion is unjust discrimination because it does not protect unborn babies. Defending children, who have a right to a mom and a dad, by not permitting same sex couples to adopt children is just discrimination. Why? Because marriage is naturally ordered to the gift of children who have a God-given right to a mother and a father.

This is part and parcel of the "Laws of Nature and Nature's God" which is found in the first paragraph of the <u>Declaration of Independence</u>. God's natural law precedes religion, and supports the supernatural law of God's grace in the sacraments. God's saving grace builds on nature; thus, it is essential to trust God's natural law. The way we can help protect "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness" is to live a life of true reasoning and deepening conversion. We thus follow Jesus Christ more closely within his Catholic Church and pray for true reasoning and deeper conversion, even to the point of making sacrifices to win over errant people to God and his natural order. ## From Father McCabe

Short Autobiography of Fr. Thomas McCabe

I was born on November 8, 1965. I am the 5<sup>th</sup> of 7 children born to John and Doris McCabe. My dad was a Lt. for the St. Paul Police Dept. and my mom was a LP nurse. Both thrived in the service of God and were Catechists for several years. Still today, they go to Eucharistic Adoration every Friday at St. Peter, Forest Lake.

My family moved to Mahtomedi when I was three and we lived a block from White Bear Lake. After my paper route I would go fishing, swimming and boating, and also played sports.

After receiving the call to priesthood, I entered the St. John Vianney Seminary and graduated with a double major in Philosophy and Theology, but still unsure that I would meet the rigors of this vocation. After 4 more years of studies and training at the University of St. Thomas, St. Paul Seminary, I graduated with a Master of Divinity degree. By God's grace I was accepted by the Church and ordained into the ranks of the Presbyterate (priesthood) May 30, 1992.

My first assignment was at the Church of the Holy Spirit as parochial vicar. I also taught part time at the nearby Cretin Derham High School for 2 years. Then I was assigned for 2.5 years at the Church of St. Raphael, Crystal, MN where I worked with two other priests.

My first pastorate was at the Church of Our Lady of the Prairie, Belle Plaine, MN, where my small team and I managed to keep the Catholic school of 50 students open, did about \$450,000.00 worth of renovating, and was able to build up the bank account to about \$500,000.00 from close to zero when I first arrived. The cooperation and spirit of that community was inspiring, but not without some bumps in the road that can occur when some change is needed.

I was then assigned to the Archdiocese Mission in Venezuela after studying Spanish for the first time for only 6 months. Needless to say, I did what I could over 3.5 exciting years, but the language barrier was always very challenging.

In July 2011, I was named Pastor at the Church of the Immaculate Conception and Canonical Administrator of our consolidated Holy Cross Catholic School which served 179 students, preK  $-8^{th}$  grade. We made some significant changes that included a new principal, 5 new teachers, and formed a new collaborative vision with the parents and stakeholders. On the parish level, I was able to pay down debt and work with others in hiring a new part time Custodian, part time Office Manager, part time Musician, and a new part time Youth and Liturgy Minister.

The archbishop called me away from St. Michael and St. Albert after two years there in 2018, to work here with Fr. Kasel, and to be chaplain of the Latino Community of Goodhue, County.

For three years I have walked with you and have grown in my appreciation of your love for God, the Church and our Christian mission. It is a joy to begin this new chapter of my ministry as your new Parochial Administrator.
